Our Vision

“We believe that by everybody working together in our Island community, we can prevent child sexual abuse and build lasting change for generations to come.”

Our Mission

We are a specialist child sexual abuse service who offer direct support to children and their families and work to raise awareness with professionals and the wider community to enable everyone to understand, support and protect children.

We will

- aim to increase understanding around the subject of Child Sexual Abuse
- raise awareness for families and our community so abuse can be identified, prevented, and responded to effectively
- work alongside our partners to ensure all those working with children have increased confidence, skills and knowledge to provide appropriate support
- around prevention, protection and recovery work together to provide a
- therapeutic space for children and families impacted by child sexual abuse
- champion system change, to create a culture where all children feel confident

NSPCC Jersey provides a range of specialist services for children and families impacted by sexual abuse and sexual harm.

In 20205, there were 115 sexual crimes reported to the Police where the victim was aged 17 and under (Jersey Safeguarding Partnership.) The Jersey Children and Young People’s survey published in 2025 stated that less than 50% of Jersey children would tell if someone was trying to take advantage of them sexually and 1 in 7 children said that they knew someone who had been a victim of sexual exploitation.

Working in partnership with colleagues within the NSPCC and in other services across the Island, our team are delivering important awareness raising and preventative work including:

Speak out Stay Safe (SOSS): A safeguarding programme consisting of assemblies and workshops with age-appropriate content, for 5–11-year-olds, to learn about abuse and what to do if they are worried. We have recruited volunteers to support the delivery of this service on the Island [Speak out Stay safe programme | NSPCC Learning](#)

Influencing work. We work in partnership with colleagues in both statutory and voluntary sectors and are represented on numerous multi agency professional forums. We have been consulted with regards to legislation and policy, most recently with regards to online harms.

Letting the Future In (LTFI): is designed to help children and young people who have experienced sexual abuse rebuild their lives. We support children and young people aged between 4-to 17-years-old so that they can recover from the impact abuse has had on their lives. Referrals can also be made for children or young people with learning disabilities up until the age of 19.

Letting the Future In Siblings (LTFIS): supports the siblings of those children who have been sexually abused. Increasingly we are aware that when sexual abuse has been disclosed, there will be impact for all family members, so we are very pleased to be able to extend this service to include other children within the family.

Turn the Page: Harmful Sexual Behaviour (HSB): is defined as “sexual behaviours expressed by children and young people under the age of 18 that are developmentally inappropriate, may be harmful towards themselves or others and/or be abusive towards another child, young person or adult”.

Where there are instances of harmful sexual behaviour, the child displaying the harm may also have experienced some form of abuse and or neglect themselves. This programme works with those children displaying harmful behaviours, and the safe adults in their lives, to address their needs, wider safeguarding concerns and prevent further harm.

Additional information: We operate a duty system Mon - Fri to ensure that any requests for information are managed in a timely way, responding to referrals from both professionals and families and in addition, managing requests for information from colleagues at MASH.

Although not staffed locally, it should be noted that the NSPCC service offer on the Island also includes free access to Childline (T 0800 1111 and the Helpline that offers advice and support to adults (T 0808 800 5000.)

Update 2025/26

There has been some fantastic work that has been taking place in conjunction with our colleagues from the Schools Service, with Speak Out Stay Safe sessions now offered to every primary school on the Island.

We have received amazing feedback and ‘Buddy’ is now recognised across primary schools as children hear the positive ‘Speak Out Stay Safe’ messages.

We have been inspected for the second time by the Jersey Care Commission. As a Social Work service on the Island, we are subject to registration and annual inspections from the Jersey Care Commission.

We welcomed Chris Sherwood to the Island in July, and participated in the annual celebration of childhood, [Jersey Children's Day](#)

It was estimated that 8,000 people attended the event (including the always popular Pantasaurus) where we took the opportunity to talk to parents and children about our joint online safety campaign, ‘Be the First Filter.’

Direct Services

Reach in 2025/26

- Between 1 April 2025 – 31 March 2026, our NSPCC practitioners at our **Jersey Service Centre** worked with **37 children and adults (27 children and 10 adults)**.

Local Campaigns

'Be the First Filter,' is a joint campaign that was developed with parents and multi- agency colleagues. [Online Harms | Safeguarding Partnership Jersey](#)

Highlights of the campaign included:

- Welcoming almost 300 professionals to hear from industry experts and lived experience advocate, Roxy, at our online harms conference.
- Delivered a pilot course of online harms training to multi-agency professionals, now being developed by Safeguarding Partnership Jersey.
- Introduced guidance around self-generated image sharing into Jersey's Keeping Safe in Education guidance for the first time.
- Provided resources around self-gen and online safeguarding to primary schools
- Co-created parent/carer Be The First Filter resources
- Reached almost 1000 children directly through our interactive theatre in education tour.
- Co-created parent/carer workshops on children's on and offline wellbeing

During the first two weeks of December, we ran a social media campaign on Facebook, targeted at Jersey parents of early teens with the aim of directing them to the main campaign resource page. The results exceeded expectations. 35,579 Jersey parents saw our Facebook posts, parents engaged with our posts 40,146 times (e.g. Likes, comments, shares, clicks) We generated 3,900 clicks through to the campaign page We were also very pleased to be supported by local businesses who sell mobile telephones/ tablets who shared the campaign resources during the festive period.

Our work in Schools 2025/26

Speak out. Stay safe. programme

- 1 April 2025 – 31 March 2026, we reached 2,786 children in 14 schools to deliver our *Speak out Stay safe* programme and 15 of these schools received SOSS workshops as well as the online assembly and follow on resources.

This programme teaches children how to recognise abuse and neglect, empowering them to speak out if they are worried about anything.
