


Welcome on board

Thank you so much for signing up to Big Board Game Day 2017. It's time to unleash your inner board gamer by playing your part in the NSPCC's Big Board Game Day on 31 March. Whether you're a Rule Master or a Puzzled Player – you can **play along, get your friends or family involved and join the fight for every childhood.**

All you need for Big Board Game Day is a stack of board games, somewhere to play and some friends or family to get involved. The more people you invite, the more fun you'll have – and the more money you'll raise to keep children safe.

Just ask everyone who takes part to donate. Then simply collect up the money and send it back to us. Raising just £25 could pay for toys which children use during sessions to explain how they are feeling. And if you could raise £100 we could pay for a practitioner delivering four hours of Domestic Abuse Recovering Together (DART), an innovative group work programme helping children who have been affected by domestic abuse.

Whatever you raise, you'll be helping to keep children safe – children like Maisie. You can read Maisie's story of overcoming abuse and rebuilding her childhood through play in the fundraising guide

Dress up


Whether it's Mr Monopoly or Miss Scarlet, encourage friends and family to come dressed as their favourite board game characters or pieces.



Make a fundraising page

An online page like JustGiving makes fundraising easy by automatically collecting money (and Gift Aid details) from your supporters. Share the link to your page via Facebook, Twitter and email to keep people updated with your fundraising progress and encourage them to donate.

With JustTextGiving you can set up a unique text code so people can donate to your JustGiving page by text. It's easy to do, with no extra charge – just log in and follow the steps at justgiving. com/nspcc

Maisie's story

By getting on board, you'll not only be having fun and games – you'll also be helping children across the UK. The money you raise will help us to be there for children like Maisie*.

We all love to play, but for a child who's recovering from abuse, play can mean so much.

We started working with Maisie when she was just five years old. She had been sexually abused at an after-school club, and although the abuse was over, it became clear to Maisie's parents that she needed help to recover. She had gone from being a happy, sociable child who excelled at school to being completely disengaged.

Maisie starting coming to our Letting the Future In service, where NSPCC worker Amelia helped her to explore her feelings and what had happened to her in a safe way through play. Activities like playing with PlayDough helped Maisie express her anger about what had happened, and regain a feeling of control.

Maisie is doing really well now – she's much more able to talk about how she's feeling, and is getting her self-esteem and confidence back.

How your money helps

Here's how your money can help change children's lives across the UK.

£50

could pay for a sand tray and toys, which are really important therapeutic tools, helping children to describe scenes and people in their lives.

£100

could pay for a practitioner to deliver four hours of Minding the Baby, helping young, first-time mums cope with the challenges of looking after a baby.

£25

could pay for toys which children use during sessions to explain how they're feeling. £4

ould pay for one of our trained volunteer counsellors to answer a child's call for help to Childline.

Playing by the rules

When planning any fundraising event, you need to consider health and safety, and legal concerns. So, it's time to channel your inner Rule Master. But if you're not sure about something, just ask us.

NSPCC branding

By law, the NSPCC's charity registration number must appear on all posters, advertisements and other fundraising materials. Please display this as: 'National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. Registered Charity England and Wales 216401. Scotland SC037717.' Please contact your local fundraising team for permission for you or a third party to use the NSPCC name or logo.

Insurance

As your event or activity hasn't been organised by and isn't controlled by the NSPCC, it isn't covered by our insurance programme. Therefore, you may need to arrange your own insurance, unless covered by your own home insurance, for example.

Also, for any contractors, sub-contractors or external facilities used – make sure they have the relevant experience and can demonstrate evidence of the relevant insurance cover.

The NSPCC won't be liable for any loss or injury arising out of the event or its organisation.

Food hygiene and alcohol

Please take great care when handling food and work to basic rules for safe preparation, storage, display and cooking. You will need a licence if you have alcohol at your event. You can avoid this issue by either holding your event on licensed premises or by asking a local pub to organise a bar at your venue. Otherwise you'll need to submit a 'Temporary Event Notice' to the local district borough unitary council to apply for a temporary licence.

Health and safety

If you hold a fundraising event you'll be responsible for the health and safety of all involved. The Institute of Fundraising and government websites have useful information on this. Depending on your event you may need information from other sources too.

Raffles, lotteries and prize draws

Raffles, lotteries and prize draws are a highly regulated area. Please refer to the guidelines on the Big Board Game Day website.

Collections

Collections are a great way to raise money. If you're planning a collection that takes place in a publicly owned place then this is governed by strict legal requirements and must be licensed by your local authority. Please let us know your plans and wait for approval before approaching your local authority. Licences are not needed on privately owned land but you'll need the permission of the owner or business.
