How you're helping children

Everyone has a part to play in keeping children safe. And every pound your school raises will make a difference. Here's how your fundraising can help.

Top tip

On the frontline

We're ready to listen, reassure, and take action to keep children safe. And we support children and families – to stop abuse from happening and help them recover if it does.



Educating and empowering

We teach children to recognise abuse and understand it's never their fault, so they know where to turn to for help. And we support adults to protect children.



Campaigning for change

We fight for changes that will make society safer for children – always backed up by what we've learnt from the children we exist to help.

£4 could pay for one of our trained volunteer counsellors to answer a child's call for help to Childline.



£5 could pay for art materials to help a child express their feelings when they're unable to find the words.

Fundraising ideas

Whether you're a cake baker or a risk-taker. Whatever you do, every slurp, yumm or shhh will help fight for every childhood. NSPCC

Dance-athon

Dance away with a music-filled party, or organise a Strictly-style contest. Or why not, on the hour every hour, stop working and dance for 3 minutes? Classes could even learn moves before the big day and show off their groove in front of everyone! People can donate to take part, or to come and watch.

Mad Hatter tea party

Put on a cosy coffee morning or an oh-so-refined afternoon tea party, and take optional donations for tickets. You could decorate with our print-at-home bunting, and even ask parents to help with home baking or sandwiches, to make it an event to remember.

Shhhh

An idea that's sure to be popular with teachers – have a sponsored silence. Raise money, but don't shout about it! See if you can manage a silent afternoon of just nodding and pointing – maybe there could be a prize for the quietest class.

a will ood. Yunnnn Bake sale bonanza

Bake some scrumptious treats and hold a bake sale in your school for optional donations. You could use our print-athome cake toppers to show everyone you're raising money for children. And every munch, crunch, and yum is a tasty way to cook up a brilliant fundraising total.

Dress as you please day

Organise a dress down day for the whole school. Pay a donation and wear what you want – extra points for those in fancy dress!

Walk for it

Set a target distance (or location), and get the whole school involved in a big sponsored school walk. Every mile you cover will help us be here for children.

School cookbook

Pupils and parents submit their favourite recipes to a cookbook and collate it all together. Sell the cookbook and donate the money raised!

It's showtime

Go big with an all-singing, alldancing, joke-cracking talent contest, or organise a battle of the bands. Charge for entry to the contest, and for tickets to come along and watch the show. NSPCC



£25 could pay for a trained practitioner for one hour, supporting parents and families in caring for their children.



£150 could pay for one NSPCC Helpline practitioner shift, providing vital help and support to adults concerned about a child's welfare.

So, you're all fired up and ready to get fundraising. But where to begin? Tick off these simple steps to make it easy from start to finish.

Choose your activity

Pick something from our list, or come up with an idea of your own. Then you'll need to set a time and date for the event.

Set your target

Setting a fundraising target is a great way to keep everyone motivated. Decide how much you'd like to raise and how you'll collect donations (you could use JustGiving, ParentPay, Iris ParentMail or another donation method).

Spread the word

Don't be shy – make sure all pupils and parents know about the event (and maybe even the local community too). JustGiving provide QR codes, which can easily be added onto your school newsletter. Children can also be encouraged to share it with family and friends.

Add up your total

Throughout your fundraising, use your printable totaliser to keep track of the generous donations. Remember to encourage using Gift Aid for all voluntary donations – this can be done by filling out Gift Aid details on sponsorship forms.

Pay in your donations

Any online fundraising will automatically be sent to us. Other donations can be paid in online, or by cheque to NSPCC Registered Charity along with the paying-in form from your pack. Make sure you put down your school name and postcode and send to **NSPCC**, 42 **Curtain Road, London EC2A 3NH**.

Top tip

Don't forget Gift Aid! It can boost donations by 25 per cent – making your fundraising efforts go even further for children.

The technical bit

If you're planning an event, you need to think about health and safety, as well as some legal details. Unsure about anything? Just ask us.



NSPCC branding

By law, the NSPCC's charity registration number must appear on all posters, advertisements, and other fundraising materials.

If you're creating your own, please display this as: **Registered charity England and Wales 216401, Scotland SC037717 and Jersey 384**.

Please contact us for permission for you or a third party to use the NSPCC name or logo.

Health and safety

If you're organising an event yourself, make sure it comes under the terms of the school's insurance policy.

The NSPCC won't be liable for any loss or injury arising out of the event or its organisation.

Please be very careful when handling food, and work to basic rules for safe preparation, storage, display, and cooking.

If you hold a fundraising event, you will be responsible for the health and safety of all involved.

The Institute of Fundraising and government websites have useful information on this. Depending on your event, you may need information from other sources as well.

Raffles, lotteries and prize draws

Raffles, lotteries, or prize draws are a highly regulated area. **But you must not register for your own licence**. This is because NSPCC hold a Large Society Lottery Licence. And because of The Gambling Act (2005), which allows for some non-commercial gaming, even without the NSPCC's licence.
